Students should bring a laptop with Internet capabilities.

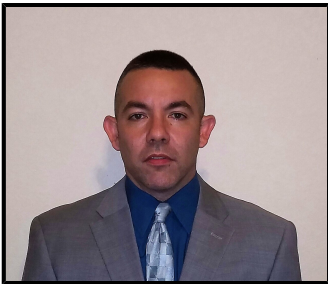
